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Message from the President By Philip Swain

Driving out of Marble Bar in Western Australia this morning I passed another 110-wheel road-train carrying 100 tonnes of iron ore to Port Hedland. These vehicles are minnows in the scheme of things in the Pilbara, but it reminded me of how much this part of Australia contributes to national prosperity. I am also acutely aware of the environmental health issues in this area and some of the contradictions they raise. I am here for a week ensuring food and water safety is being properly addressed, amongst other tasks, at various mining camps. I will drive 1500km (burning fossil fuel) to ensure that camps operate in a safe and compliant way, to maintain an industry that contributes substantially to an insatiable appetite for steel produced in China and used worldwide. To move to a more sustainable future will undoubtedly require extraordinary changes and compromises in the coming decades.

Interestingly, the Pilbara has also experienced recent environmental health impacts with the identification of Japanese Encephalitis for the first time and only a few hundred kilometres north, in the Kimberley, there have been several cases this year of Murray Valley Encephalitis and the death of a toddler. From an historical perspective the movement of arbovirus diseases across northern Australia and down through Western Australia is well documented, but the speed of this recent movement of viruses is not dissimilar to the spread of Ross River Virus during the 1980's. It is important then to remember that with more research and intervention, based on good environmental health practice, such outbreaks can be restricted or even prevented.

Last month your National Board met in Brisbane for what was a very productive three days, including an afternoon with Dr Melissa Stoneham, who worked with the National Directors and staff, on the organisation's advocacy role. My sincere thanks to Dr Stoneham for her insights and dedication to improving EHA's performance in this area. The Board's advocacy session focussed on the development of two advocacy priorities for the organisation moving forward. Unsurprisingly, those present determined workforce as an advocacy priority and the Board will be working in coming months to better impact the need for and recognition of EHO's. And there was a strong belief amongst members that the environmental health aspects of arboviruses is an area that needs a concerted effort by the profession to advocate for better understanding and control of mosquitoes and the transmission of diseases in Australia. I look forward to advancing these projects with the assistance of the National and State Boards and the broader Membership as we move into the second half of 2023.

On the workforce front EHA has continued to lobby for necessary visa changes to assist EHO's already working in Australia and to simplify options for any suitably qualified migrating EHO's in the future. Recent announcements by the Australian government in relation to avenues to citizenship are encouraging. With the current round of accreditations finalising, the shortness of graduate supply, is still not meeting demand around Australia. The Central Queensland University undergraduate course re-accreditation is being finalised as I write, and the Board is aiming to conduct the 5 yearly review of the policy in the second half of this year. I look forward to constructive input from all stakeholders, on this important milestone for the now 10-year-old policy. I again thank all those committed professionals from state governments, local governments, and our universities for their valuable volunteer contribution to this most important work on our accreditation panels.

With the end of the financial year approaching, it is now less than a year before the International Federation of Environmental Health 17th World Congress will be held in Perth, Western Australia 20th - 24th May 2024. Our Association in Western Australia are already working hard to develop and promote the event and the website and the first call for papers will be out in the next couple of weeks.

I encourage all Members to participate in this unique opportunity for the profession here in Australia.

Looking for your next EH Professional? They could be looking for you!

In August 2022 I was contacted by the Post Graduate Environmental Health Course Coordinator at Curtin University regarding a student struggling to find a work placement opportunity in New South Wales.

This student was in the final semester of her degree and urgently required this placement to be completed in order to graduate in the coming November. Despite this student having contacted numerous Councils across the Sydney basin she had no luck in obtaining a placement opportunity. In fact, many organisations either advised her that they didn't provide work placement, that she needed a traineeship to gain experience or sadly didn't provide a response to her request at all. Given the responses she had received, or lack thereof, she was even contemplating Environmental Health is struggling to fill travelling to Western Australia to complete the work placement for her degree.

Students usually seek out work placement at organisations within close proximity to their home for convenience without much thought of heading out to regional areas. I have heard many reports from regional Councils that they will happily facilitate work placement and work experience requests, however these requests are seldom received. As the Business Manager Environment & Health at one such regional organisation that has struggled to recruit Environmental Health Professionals I can confirm that we love to host students and provide the practical experience they require to graduate and ultimately start their careers in Environmental Health.

This particular student, Sapnaa Parmar, started her work placement with us not long after this and threw herself into the experience wholeheartedly. Sapnaa joined us three days per week undertaking a range of activities including food premise inspections, water sampling, customer request investigation, updating education materials and contributed to our team at every opportunity. Unknown to Sapnaa at the time, our Council was about to advertise an Environmental Health Officer position with a range from Graduate to experienced Officer. Sapnaa's work placement unintentionally became an informal on the job training period and when she applied for the position she was

able to draw on the skills, knowledge and experience learnt during her work placement and her formal qualifications to put herself at the very top of the applicant pool and ultimately be selected as our preferred candidate for the position.

Sapnaa completed her work placement, graduated as scheduled, commenced her full-time position as an Environmental Health Officer with Goulburn Mulwaree Council and is a very valued addition to our team. Sapnaa relocated her family to Goulburn for the role and without the opportunities provided during her work placement with our organisation this would likely never of occurred.

Recent reports and our lived experience show us that as a profession vacancies and attract the next generation of Environmental Health Professionals into the workforce in a competitive market. As such we all need to do what we can to attract, retain, retrain, upskill and develop our workforce through facilitating opportunities for both students and those already working in the field. This can be achieved through taking student placements, continuing to build relationships and opportunities for resource sharing and networking across State and Local Government organisations, providing career development prospects for professionals to move into team leader and management functions, ongoing mentoring and on the job training and also job sharing experience between inner city and regional professionals to ensure our workforce can undertake the diverse functions of the role including tasks such as on-site sewage management and illegal dumping that those in inner city postings may not have access to.

Our message to students looking for work placement - reach out to regional organisations for placement opportunities as the experience you obtain at a regional organisation is diverse, contact the EHA Executive Officers in your relevant State to see if they have connections within their network that may be able to facilitate a work placement opportunity, don't be discouraged if you receive a no - keep knocking on doors until you find where you are meant to be and throw yourself

into any opportunity provided during your work placement (it may just be one long job interview and a foot in the door to start your career).

To organisations in a position to take on work placement students - do it! It is an excellent opportunity for your organisation to help grow the next generation particularly in an industry crying out for skilled professionals - often providing an opportunity to complete tasks that are unable to be actioned with regular resource constraints, is low risk (the student is covered by the University's insurance policy), gives your team the opportunity to provide mentorship and impart their skills and knowledge unique to your organisation and it may just lead to you finding your next valuable team member.

These are but just a few of the positives - the list really is endless, and in my experience it really makes you feel good to be able to provide these opportunities, ignite a passion for our field and possibly be one of the reasons someone joins us for an awesome career in Environmental Health!

WHAT CAN YOU DO TO ADDRESS THE ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH **WORKFORCE SHORTAGE?**

1. Host a student placement from an EHA accredited course, they could be your next team member!

2. Take on a student currently studying an EHA accredited course and employ them as a cadet or a trainee.

3. Employ a science graduate and support this person for a further one year of full time study or two years of part-time study to complete an EHA accredited post graduate qualification (there are five to choose from). This is a small investment with the outcome being a qualified environmental health professional.

EHO Workforce Survey

Dr Kirstin Ross Et Al.

In a recent survey conducted by Flinders University 180 responses were received from all states and territories. Most respondents were EHOs from local government.

In summary, there is a significant workforce shortage, especially in regional and rural areas.

All states reported high levels of "Definitely not/probably not" to the question "Do you currently have enough staff to fulfil your regulatory responsibilities.

Recruiting suitable applicants was "Impossible" for eight councils, and "Difficult" or "Very difficult" for 109/180 respondents.

Significant anecdotal evidence was collated. A few quotes below:

- "Must be able to recruit and invest in graduate students. Minimal experience available on the market"
- "Have tried twice now to fill an outstanding LSL position. Used the WA EHO google group each time as we need a person who

can step up immediately to fill a short term temporary role. No luck either time and as a result the employee is unable to take LSL owing as position can not be backfilled successfully."

- "It is getting very hard to find qualified and suitably experienced EHOs so considerations are made to get unqualified (not degree level) staff to ensure the work can get done. This can lead to a lowering of skills and knowledge especially in the area of food safety."
- "Our last recruitment for • a qualified EHO was quite successful in that we had a number of applicants with high level skills and experience. This was unusual compared to previous recruitment rounds where we have struggled to attract good quality applicants. Our thinking is that our Council had become a much more attractive place to work given a salary system review resulted in EHOs receiving a significant pay rise, the COVID

pandemic causing many staff to look for new employers, and the fact that our Council had implemented a very enticing flexible working arrangements policy that was clearly stated to remain even after the pandemic was over. All this made us an employer of choice."

"We have been trying to recruit 2 EHO positions for over 12 months. Unsuccessful, qualified people not applying. Explored cadets, explored Grad Dip options again unsuccessful. Still trying to recruit 2 full time positions. The region is also down EHOs. 2 neighbouring Local Governments currently also down staff, one is down 3 EHOs (currently no EHOs employed) other is down 2 EHOs (leaving 1 EHO to carry workload. The region is struggling to cope, actually not coping."

The Highfield approach to improving food safety

Richard Sprenger - Chairman, Highfield Group

For over 50 years I have initiated or taken part in many projects/ schemes intended to improve food safety, with varying degrees of success.

Training programmes and Food Safety Management Systems/ HACCP are probably two of the most important.

Many training programmes, especially mandatory programmes, have focused on food handlers and certification, instead of supervisor/ management training and implementation of knowledge/ competency.

One of the few countries to use the competency approach was Ireland.

The US requirement for a Person in Charge programme is a great food safety initiative and one that was a part catalyst for the very successful Dubai Food Safety Programme.

I am proud to have worked with Dubai Municipality to establish this programme which is still going strong and one of the reasons for Dubai having such high standards of food safety, especially in 4 and 5 star hotels and the tourist hospitality industry. Highfield has now taken this programme a step further with three very important additions.

The Manager in Charge of Food Safety (<u>https://www.</u> <u>highfieldinternational.com/</u> <u>highfield-certified-programmes</u>) must:

- Obtain 4 x Level3

 internationally recognised qualifications Food safety, HACCP, Allergen management and Effective Auditing (takes 5 to 6 days to complete).
- Carry out monthly recorded audits, including timely remedial action. The reports to be available for viewing by enforcement officers and third party or corporate auditors.
- Complete 24 hours of 'practical' CPD annually.

If managers and supervisors are to obtain relevant information and keep up to date with food safety incidents, we need to provide free, accessible reputable sites/platforms where food handlers/managers/trainers can get the latest accurate, sciencebased, reliable food safety information.

There are lots of sites available where information is provided,

some good and some very poor, but how would most food handlers know the difference?

Federal Budget updates on the Australian CDC

The Government will provide \$91.1 million over two years from 2023– 24 (including \$0.2 million in capital) to commence the establishment of the Australian Centre for Disease Control (CDC) over the next two years, as detailed in the Budget papers published on Tuesday 9 May 2023 (Budget Paper 2,p.131).

The Department of Health and Aged Care will create an interim CDC from 1 January 2024, and this will be housed within the department and headed by the Commonwealth's Chief Medical Officer, Professor Paul Kelly.

In a virtual stakeholder webinar with portfolio ministers to talk about Budget announcements for health, aged care and sport on Wednesday 10 May 2023, the Health Minister, Mark Butler MP, emphasised data and infectious diseases as the initial foci of the CDC. Having one repository of data through which data is shared will be a priority.

There will be a (yet to be decided) statutory authority or other model, with the objective of both the commonwealth and states and territories to develop a rounded system that can address opportunities for prevention and chronic disease.

Environmental Health Australia (EHA) welcomes this substantial next step towards establishing one of the most important public health initiatives in a generation and urges the government to ensure its longterm commitment and scaling up of funding to ensure the CDC can meet its commitments and achieve its mission.

EHA is encouraged by the mentioning of prevention in the scope of the CDC and will continue to advocate to the government the important and central role environmental health, EHA and its professional members play on a day in, day out basis that would significantly contribute to achieving the CDC's mission.

Although the detail on the allocation of the \$91.1 million hasn't been disclosed, EHA would like to see proportionate funding allocated to the environmental health sector, reflecting the vital role environmental health experts will play in the codesign of CDC environmental health data acquisition and analysis, the implementation of the One Health model and the implementation of the infectious disease control and prevention agenda.

Investment in environmental health has proven outcomes and its early enhanced integration into the existing States and Territories health systems and services will have value-adding benefits. Environmental health that goes beyond filling gaps is the key for the CDC to achieve transformative change early and set the Australian Government's substantial investment up for ongoing success, ensuring the CDC can economically and effectively fulfil its mission and provide a world class template for countries to build back better after the COVID-19 pandemic.

Environmental Health Australia was a stakeholder in consultation processes that have explored the roles and responsibilities of an Australian CDC and is continuing to actively represent members interests as the development of the CDC progresses.

Chris gave an insightful presentation centred around Tikanga Māori and the concept of 'Mahi Tahi' or working together. Referring to Tikanga Māori (customs and protocols) prompts us to really consider how connected we are to Papatūānuku, our Earth Mother. As Chris said during his presentation, the more connected we are to our environment, which includes our Whakapapa (family roots/connections) and where we come from, the more likely we are to look after it. Here's some key points from Chris's presentation:

- The Concept of Pa: In the context of Public Health and Tapa Wha (Protecting our 'house')
- The 3 P's of Public Health: Person, Pathway, Pathogen
- The 3 T's of Tapa Wha: Tikanga (Protocols/Customs), Tangata (People), Taiao (Places/Environment)



The Pa model represents layers of working relationships. From a health perspective, how does a Pathogen relate to a Pathway and people? Similarly, how do Māori customs and protocols relate to protecting people and places (also known as the environment). The answer is working together in the spirit of collaboration and collectiveness towards common goals. In the context of World earth day, this means using protocols, customs, or other framework such as rules and laws of society to help protect the people and places/ environment of earth. Hence, Mahi Tahi – let's work together to help look after mother earth, being conscious of preserving natural resources, reducing waste and damage to the world we live in. Remember, it only takes us all doing one thing to help lead change. So we in New Zealand challenge you wherever you are in the world to do just one thing. THE BLACK SOLDIER FLY CENTRE: REVOLUTIONIZING WASTE MANAGEMENT AND SUSTAINABILITY EFFORTS

Black Soldier Fly (BSF) is a unique insect as they are not pests and do not pose environmental health hazards like the common flies. The black soldier fly, Hermetia illucens is a type of insect that is abundant in warmer regions. It is recognized for its black body and translucent wings at the tips.

The commercial use of black soldier flies and their larvae have grown in recent years due to their potential as a sustainable source of protein and their capacity to contribute to environmental sustainability. Future research and development into the function of BSF might help create various sustainable and environmentally friendly products.

Black Soldier Fly Centre at Centre for Environmental Health and Safety Studies, Faculty of Health Sciences, Universiti Teknologi MARA (UiTM), Puncak Alam Campus in Malaysia in strategic partnership with Entomal Biotech Malaysia and Malaysian Association of Environmental Health (MAEH) serves as a hub for scientific investigations, aiming to unlock the full potential of these insects in waste management, agriculture, and sustainability initiatives. Researchers at the center; Dr Ahmad Razali Ishak, Associate Professor Dr Farah Ayuni Shafie and Razi Ikhwan Md Rashid conduct studies on the life cycle, reproduction, and feeding habits of black soldier flies to better understand their behavior and optimize their usage.

BSF larvae have a remarkable ability to consume and break down organic waste efficiently. They can convert various organic materials such as food waste, agricultural by-products, into nutrient-rich feed sources for livestock, aquaculture, pet food and even pharmaceuticals products.

The Black Soldier Fly Centre collaborates with various industries, government agencies, and research institutions to promote awareness, knowledge exchange, and the implementation of black soldier fly-based research. The center serves as a training ground for students and professionals interested in this field, providing them with hands-on experience and research opportunities.

AS 4674-2004 Construction and fit out of a food premises

EHA has been made aware that AS 4674-2004 Construction and fit out of a food premises is currently under review.

EHA, as the peak professional body representing the interests of environmental health professionals across Australia, was involved in the development of this standard in 2004.

Standards Australia have advised that the Standard needs to be updated to align with current practices.

The current Standard, AS 4674-2004 Construction and fit out of a food premises, remains the Standard to be used for this purpose until a new standard has been developed.

EHA will be taking the lead and working with Standards Australia for the redrafting of the Australian Standard for the Construction and fit out of a food premises.

When the scope of the project and timeline has been established, EHA will be seeking input from members to assist with redrafting the Standard.

We look forward to your input so that we can progress with this important task.

"This Standard was prepared by Standards Australia Committee BD-095, Retail Food Premises, in response to a request from the Food Standards Australia New Zealand (formerly ANZFA), to provide the food industry, the construction industry and governments across Australia with uniform criteria for the hygienic design, construction and fit-out of food premises.

The objective of this Standard is to provide criteria for architects, the construction industry and health and building regulators to cooperatively ensure that buildings used by food businesses are designed, constructed and fitted out in compliance with the requirements of the Australian Food Standards Code, Standard 3.2.3, Food Premises and Equipment, which will assist food businesses to produce safe food.

The scope of the Standard is limited to permanent buildings used by the food service industry, by food retailers and by smallscale food manufacturers.

The Australian Building Codes Board (ABCB) is also considering including specific requirements for food premises in the Building Code of Australia (BCA).

When preparing plans for new

food premises or alterations to existing premises, advice should be sought from the appropriate government agency responsible for food safety in the area where the premises is located.

Notes to clauses in this Standard do not form a mandatory requirement for compliance with this Standard.

The Committee wishes to acknowledge the assistance of the Australian Institute of Environmental Health in the preparation of this document, particularly for permission to use their publication The National Code for the Construction and Fitout of Food Premises, which is superseded by this Standard.

Valuable assistance was also given by organizations experienced in the design and construction of food premises and the Committee acknowledges their help"
